D'var Torah given by Courtney Thomas

This week's Parshah is Shoftim. The word Shoftim literally translates into justice. The most famous words of this Parshah are "tzedek, tzedek tirdof: justice, justice, you shall pursue." Many people ask why justice is used twice. There are two opinions for this; one is the obvious reason that it was used twice for significance. The other opinion is that the first justice is personal and the second is the justice of the courts. Tirdof is a strange word to use, because the root word rodef is usually used negatively, to pursue someone to threaten his or her life. The point of using such a serious word is because it is for emphasis on the fact that we must seriously be just, and we should seek justice. We can see another example from when we see Aaron described as a man who "ohev shalom v'rodef shalom" or loves peace and pursues it. Obviously this isn't meant in a hostile way. There are two approaches to this word; it could be used positively or negatively. This parshah is trying to show us that we should approach this commandment positively and respectfully.
